

## **History Long Term Overview**

## Intent

At Plumpton School we aim to provide a history curriculum which promotes curiosity within our children, inspiring them to foster a deep understanding of the past, develop critical thinking skills and a sense of identity. We aim to instil a curiosity about historical events and figures, encouraging learners to engage with diverse perspectives, while developing our children's ability to analyse, interpret and evaluate historical sources. Our curriculum is designed to build knowledge, sound chronological awareness, understanding of key historical terms alongside developing an understanding of cause and effect, continuity and change, and similarity and difference. This works alongside a progression of key historical skills that are returned to and built on as the children move through the school.

## Implementation.

Our history curriculum is taught on a two-year rolling programme within each class. The curriculum ensures that children have the opportunity to build their knowledge and understanding as they progress through the school, revisiting and consolidating key concepts through relevant and meaningful contexts.

Each lesson incorporates an enquiry question which is investigated using a progression of skills:

**Chronological understanding** 

**Historical enquiry** 

Interpretation of history

Range and depth of historical understanding.

## **Impact**

Each unit has a specific assessment aims to track the progress of our learners. Teachers use both formative and summative forms of assessment including observations, verbal questions aimed at specific children, and the completion of learning tasks designed to underpin key learning points. Teachers use their professional judgement to assess the depth of each child's understanding of the key learning points of their lessons.
